

## Two Minute Challenge: I-Clicker

You are taking a large lecture class with over 600 students in Foellinger Auditorium. You have a group of friends that you normally sit with during the class. The professor takes attendance by asking I-Clicker questions each class. The points amount to 15% of your Final grade. Your friend says he will not be attending the next class because he is going home for an extended weekend to see his girlfriend from another school. He does not want to lose participation points and asks you to use his I-Clicker for him so that he will receive full attendance points. You have heard that some students have gotten caught using other students I-Clickers before and that the punishment could be a minimum of losing all of your attendance points for the semester. On the other hand, it is a huge class. As long as you are discreet, what are the chances someone would see? What should you do?
