GRANTMAKING STRATEGY

In selecting projects for funding, the Sloan Foundation seeks proposals for original initiatives led by outstanding individuals or teams. They are interested in projects that have a **high expected return to society**, exhibit a **high degree of methodological rigor**, and for which **funding from the private sector**, **government**, **or other foundations is not yet widely available**.

Alfred P. Sloan Foundation: Interested Applicants



The Foundation does not accept or review unsolicited grant proposals

STEP 1: INTERESTED APPLICANTS SHOULD READ THE FOUNDATION'S WEBSITE

- Grant applications should be made to a **specific program**.
- The *Program* sections include a statement of each program's goals, a description of the strategies employed, a list of recent grants, and information about how to apply.
- Interested applicants are encouraged to browse through https://sloan.org/grants-database to get a feeling for the kind of projects the program supports.

STEP 2: APPLICANTS SUBMIT A LETTERS OF INQUIRY BY EMAIL TO THE APPROPRIATE PROGRAM DIRECTOR

- NOTE: Not all programs accept unsolicited inquiries.
- The Apply section of each program specifies whether inquiries are currently accepted.

STEP 3: PROMISING LETTERS OF INQUIRY WILL BE INVITED TO SUBMIT A FORMAL GRANT PROPOSAL
